Description of Position:

This is a full-time or core position as Assistant Principal Violin II of the Mississippi Symphony Orchestra (MSO). The job consists of performing all duties of Assistant Principal Violin II in the Orchestra (maximum of 95 services).

Applicant agrees to perform all MSO and services requested subject to the terms enumerated in the Collective Bargaining Agreement between the Jackson Federation of Musicians (JFM), Local 579 American Federation of Musicians (AFM), and the Mississippi Symphony Orchestra Association (MSO). Winning candidates will be eligible for tenure after the completion of 2 seasons. This position does not reimburse for travel.

The MSO rehearses and performs primarily on nights and weekends. There are some daytime orchestral educational services. Actual service usage for the season averages around 80.

The Mississippi Symphony Orchestra presents a 38-week season beginning September 1 and concluding May 31. The MSO is comprised of full-time core of 27 musicians and supplemented, as repertoire requires, by local and regional musicians. Musicians of the MSO are covered under a collective bargaining agreement between the JFM, Local 579 AFM, and MSO.
